Every year in the U.S., riding lawn-mower accidents maim hundreds of innocent children, according to the Consumer Products Safety Commission.



Why Such Danger?

In reverse, the blades on most riding lawn mowers continue to spin. While backing, if the operator does not see a child, the results can be tragic: death, amputation, broken bones and serious disfiguring lacerations.

It's quite easy to eliminate this known hazard. For less than \$5 per mower, an automatic blade stop can be incorporated into the design. When the mower is shifted into reverse, the blade quits spinning, unless a manual override is engaged.

There Is A Fix.

It costs you nothing to investigate your legal rights. If the child is under the age of 18, no matter when the injury occurred, place this call.
